# Update on Emergency Funds - Food Distribution in Malawi

In response to the devastating the flooding and civic destruction in Southern Malawi due to Cyclone Freddie, a total of \$3500US in funds was sent to the Orthodox Church of Malawi under Archbishop Fotios. Scores of bags of maize (corn) were acquired on the markets where available and personally delivered by Fr. Nicodemos Chilembwe, the Vicar General.

Father drove from village to village, down washed out roads, to visit people whose impoverished homes where further destruction by the Cyclone made some uninhabitable. Upon his arrival at the local parish church, he would be greeted by the local parish priest, and the people would gather as the parish would become the distribution center for the maize, a staple of Malawian life. Ss Athanasios

and Cyril parish in the Kalimbuka area of Zomba district, under the administration of Fr. Basil, served as the primary center for coordination. Zomba district was among the hardest hit areas. This included the outreach to the villages of Swali, Katete and Kalimbuka.

It is hard to believe that we have been working on the Isaíah 44 Project for an entire year! What started as a chat about where God was leading our family has resulted in new relationships, new possibilities for service, and much education about patience and faithfulness —

**PATIENCE** – The challenges of working outside my "comfort zone" of those things I can control has led to a new-found appreciation of this virtue – and the certain knowledge that I have much work to do in this area.

**FAITHFULNESS** – God is faithful. While I have always known this, my responsibility in remaining faithful to Him and trusting His timing will be a life-long effort.

One of the many things I have learned during this year is the need for watchfulness. During this year, there have been times when I have had to consciously stop to appreciate "the journey to water."
